

Conducting Research: Postgraduate DL residential course in Gerontology

The Centre for Research on Ageing offers a residential course on poverty and inequality over the life course, as part of the MSc Gerontology (Distance Learning). This course is primarily targeted to Distance Learning students, however face-to-face students from the MSc Gerontology and MSc Gerontology (Research) programmes are also invited to attend particular learning and social functions. The aim of the course is to enhance the students' research skills and deepen their knowledge in the areas of poverty and health inequality over the life course and across the world, taking into consideration the complexity in defining and measuring poverty and health inequality, especially among older people. In addition, the course addresses policy challenges and academic knowledge gaps that arise in both developing and developed countries by considering relevant research methods and sources.

As part of the course, students will have the opportunity to conduct targeted literature research on one of the topics related to poverty or inequality. By the end of the course, all participants will have an opportunity to present their research findings to the group. The group activities will guide students to reflect on key policy-related topics, while the 'brainstorm' sessions are designed to provide an opportunity to generate ideas, research projects and policy reforms on specific themes related to poverty and inequality.
