Programme Overview

Brief outline of the programme

Oceanography is the science that studies physical, chemical, geological and biological processes within the Earth's oceans. The oceans cover over 70 per cent of the Earth's surface and are fundamentally important to the human race as a source of food, energy, and minerals.

Oceanography has a diverse range of practical applications including predicting storm surges or tidal waves that threaten coastal regions, studying the processes that cause beach erosion, assessing how offshore engineering affects the environment and managing fisheries for long-term sustainability. A degree in oceanography will give you an understanding of a broad range of scientific disciplines, and how different aspects can be integrated to study a complex system. The mix of quantitative and descriptive areas is highly-prized by many different employers outside of marine science, as well as being increasingly important for subject-specific employment.

The University's [Language Centre](#) has devised a language component especially for scientists, which will comprise 25 per cent of your degree. Student's will continue to improve their French; particularly specialist science language and communication skills, making graduates highly employable with a range of transferable skills.

Your contact hours will vary depending on your module/option choices. Full information about contact hours is provided in individual module profiles.

Learning and teaching

You will develop core knowledge and understanding, subject specific skills and general and transferable, graduate key skills via compulsory module and specialised option module lectures, tutor and student -led tutorials, student-led seminars and presentations, essay and report writing, use of the internet, guided independent study, group study and your own research. Experimental, research, experimental design, data processing and interpretive/analytical skills are further developed through laboratory and practical classes and fieldwork (including boat-work).

Assessment

To test your knowledge and understanding of material presented in the lectures and associated practicals, you will be assessed via a combination of written examinations, essays, group and individual oral presentations, poster presentations and short coursework assignments. Experimental, analytical and research skills are assessed through laboratory experiment write-ups, library based project work, research project reports, field notebooks, fieldwork/boat-work exercises and/or reports.

Taught by expert staff, students will be part of an innovative research environment with access to cutting edge facilities including our dedicated research vessels. Fieldwork is an integral part of the course and students are coached in a variety of current fieldwork techniques in a number of exciting locations. In year three students will complete and independent project in one of our research groups.

Educational Aims of the Programme

The spectrum of programmes within ocean and Earth science are all scientifically exciting and challenging, as well as highly relevant to the modern world. Within this particular programme of study, we aim to develop and enhance your knowledge of and enthusiasm for oceanography. There is a natural and important synergy between geology and the scientific disciplines of marine biology, oceanography and physical geography, in particular as they apply to the natural environment. We offer the opportunity to study oceanography with one of these disciplines.

The overall ethos of the 4-year MSci programmes, compared with the 3-year BSc programmes, is to provide both a broader and in-depth knowledge base across the breadth of the subject, and to allow a greater emphasis on individual research skills.

The MSci Oceanography with French programme has been designed to provide both advanced science and

language training, combined with the exciting prospect of spending your third year studying in a different cultural environment at the Université Bordeaux. You will be part of a group of 30-40 French students, studying introductory courses in oceanographic disciplines and specialist options. All modules are delivered in French.

Research carried out by academic staff provides direct and enthusiastic input into a challenging and stimulating teaching programme. There are also unique opportunities for you to undertake research projects with scientists outside Ocean and Earth Science based at the National Oceanography Centre Southampton.

The specific aims of these programmes are to:

- Provide you with a coherent programme of study which will offer you an extensive and in-depth knowledge and understanding of modern marine sciences and through flexibility of choice, to allow you to develop some degree of specialisation within fields and disciplines of choice.
- Provide you with a high-quality and intellectually stimulating experience of learning in a supportive environment.
- Equip you to undertake a successful career as a professional oceanographer in any field or a career in a wide range of other contexts.
- Provide you with a sound background and suitable qualification that would enable you to proceed to a more specialist higher degree at the MSc or PhD level.
- Develop your critical and analytical problem-solving powers, especially in relation to the marine sciences.
- Develop your intellectual, practical and fieldwork skills in the collection, analysis, interpretation and understanding of oceanographic/geographic/geological data.
- Develop your powers of observation, analysis and understanding in order that you can make decisions with appropriate acknowledgement of uncertainties.
- Enhance your interpersonal skills, in a wide range of contexts.
- Provide you with opportunities for shared multi-disciplinary learning in the marine sciences.
- Enable you to engage with life-long learning, study and enquiry, and to appreciate the value of education and research to society.
- Enable you to meet the academic requirements, in part, for registration as a Chartered Scientist and Chartered Marine Scientist with the Institute of Marine Engineering, Science and Technology (IMarEST).
- Enable you to engage with life-long learning, study and enquiry, and to appreciate the value of education and research to society. [MSci programme only].
- Give you the experience of undertaking an original project at the forefront of Earth or Marine science in a professional research environment. [MSci programme only].
- Provide you with the experience of high-quality teaching in a different learning environment and in a range of topics on the related subject in another institution [Study Abroad and with French Programme only].
- Enable you to communicate in French at a professional level in your particular area of interest, by providing you with French language expertise and practical experience of French culture [MSci Oceanography with French only].
- Provide you with a sound basis for a successful career in the European market in a relevant area of marine science or in a wide range of other contexts [MSci Oceanography with French only].

Programme Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this programme you will have knowledge and understanding of:

- B7. The structure and functioning of, and interactions between, the lithosphere, hydrosphere, atmosphere and biosphere.
- B8. The implications of climate change on the marine environment, and the role of marine systems in climate change.
- B9. The range of mathematical and statistical methods applied to the biological and physical marine sciences.
- B10. An awareness of human impact and exploitation on the biological and physical environment and its natural resources, and the resulting feedback on human societies.
- B11. Write cohesive texts which are beginning to approach comparable native-student standards in terms of accuracy, textual and rhetorical devices and range of expression.
- B12. Transfer information from spoken and written French texts into English and start to do the same from English into French.
- B13. Read and understand the main ideas and detail in authentic texts in a variety of genres (including email, newspapers, textbooks and literature).
- B14. Engage confidently and accurately in conversations, discussions, and presentations relating to everyday topics and a range of scientific and technical topics.

Part I

The programme is divided into individual study modules at each part. Each study module is accredited as being worth a certain number of credit points to you on successful completion. Modules are normally worth 7.5 ECTS (15 CATS) which is equivalent to 150 hours of study. Normally up to 60 hours comprises contact teaching (lectures, practical sessions, tutorials, etc.), and the remainder of the time is for your own independent study. Modules are generally assessed at the end of each semester, but some are assessed entirely by coursework throughout the duration of the module.

At the Partner Institutions [for Study Abroad/with French programme] the academic year is divided into “Semesters or Quarters”. In general the academic year will commence either late August, or mid-September and end in June. The Semester/Quarter dates vary from Institution to Institution, and you will be provided with more detailed information nearer the time. Teaching and learning in each Semester/Quarter is between 12 – 15 weeks, with 1-2 weeks for examinations.

In Part 1, there are a number of compulsory modules, which lay a solid foundation in the basic discipline of this programme. A compulsory Mathematics module is also taken, depending on your mathematical background. More specialised training and options that enable diversification commence in future years.

If you are following the Study Abroad or with French programme, for Part 3 you will enrol at your chosen institution to take a variety of exciting modules that build on core areas of marine sciences as well as options that will enable you to follow your specific interests. During your time abroad, summative assessment will be undertaken by the partner institution and for this purpose, a marks conversion scheme has been agreed.

In Parts 3 and 4 students are exposed to the forefronts of oceanographic knowledge, with the opportunity to conduct supervised original research. In Part 4 you will undertake a major research project which may involve external stakeholders and in which you will play a significant role in the design stage.

The MSci programmes are intended to develop research skills, and computational and quantitative skills in a more multi-disciplinary context than is possible in a three-year degree structure. You will also be exposed to cutting edge research, participating in seminar presentations in wide-ranging and specialist topics. There will be an opportunity to choose modules from a wide range of master’s level options.

Support for student learning

There are facilities and services to support your learning some of which are accessible to students across the University and some of which will be geared more particularly to students in your particular Faculty or discipline area.

The University provides:

- library resources, including e-books, on-line journals and databases, which are comprehensive and up-to-date; together with assistance from Library staff to enable you to make the best use of these resources
- high speed access to online electronic learning resources on the Internet from dedicated PC Workstations onsite and from your own devices; laptops, smartphones and tablet PCs via the Eduroam wireless network. There is a wide range of application software available from the Student Public Workstations.
- computer accounts which will connect you to a number of learning technologies for example, the Blackboard virtual learning environment (which facilitates online learning and access to specific learning resources)
- standard ICT tools such as Email, secure filestore and calendars.
- access to key information through the MySouthampton Student Mobile Portal which delivers timetables, Module information, Locations, Tutor details, Library account, bus timetables etc. while you are on the move.
- IT support through a comprehensive website, telephone and online ticketed support and a dedicated helpdesk in the Hartley Library.
- Enabling Services offering support services and resources via a triage model to access crisis management, mental health support and counselling. Support includes daily Drop In at Highfield campus at 13.00 – 15.00 (Monday, Wednesday and Friday out of term-time) or via on-line chat on weekdays from 14.00 – 16.00. Arrangements can also be made for meetings via Skype.
- assessment and support (including specialist IT support) facilities if you have a disability, long term health problem or Specific Learning Difficulty (e.g. dyslexia).
- the Student Services Centre (SSC) to assist you with a range of general enquiries including financial matters, accommodation, exams, graduation, student visas, ID cards
- Career and Employability services, advising on job search, applications, interviews, paid work, volunteering and internship opportunities and getting the most out of your extra-curricular activities alongside your degree programme when writing your CV
- Other support that includes health services (GPs), chaplaincy (for all faiths) and 'out of hours' support for students in Halls and in the local community, (18.00-08.00)
- A Centre for Language Study, providing assistance in the development of English language and study skills for non-native speakers.

You will also have a shadow tutor for contact if your personal academic tutor is absent. You can also approach the Programme Leader for Oceanography, or the Academic Unit's Senior Tutor if necessary.

- Two large computer clusters at the NOCS for dedicated use by undergraduate students, with extra computer resources for integrated Masters students. Additional computer clusters are available for your use on the other University campuses, as well as at the Halls of Residence.
- Teaching staff via email and personal contact.
- Support from the administrative staff of the Student Office, which is readily available during the normal working day.
- Training on the Ocean and Earth Science's research vessel, which is fully equipped for boat-work

practicals and project work in the local estuary and coastal waters and in our shore-side laboratory and aquarium facilities.

- Equipment to support your field work, including laptop computers, GPS, specialised shipboard data acquisition systems.
- A research-led environment at the NOCS, which provides a high quality learning environment for students.
- A wide range of well-equipped laboratories which are available for student project work, and specific study rooms.
- Close collaboration between Ocean and Earth Science and staff from the Natural Environment Research Council's NOCS provides additional support for student learning, particularly with regard to independent research projects.
- Specialised teaching labs and lecture theatre at the NOCS.

The Partner Institutions [Oceanography with Study Abroad/Oceanography with French] will provide:

- Specialist support from the equivalent International Office. Staff will normally assist with a number of arrangements: housing, registration, health care, mandatory insurance, authorisation for employment, as well as information on academic requirements, campus and community life, Immigration Service regulations and finances.
- Arrangements for Enrolment (orientation): All international students are normally required to attend special orientation and general orientation programmes. The programmes are designed to expedite practical matters such as establishing records, arranging for registration, etc. Administrative staff will normally help with housing arrangements, tax questions, and the adjustments and acclimatisation to the Institution.
- A Personal Tutor. All students will have a tutor (normally the Programme Leader) who shall be responsible for providing academic advice, regular formative feedback on progress and reporting on your progress with the equivalent Southampton Programme Leader.
- Access to Library, IT, special needs facilities: You will have access to the library, IT and special needs facilities. Additionally, you will have access to sports facilities; international student clubs, etc. [Please note there may be a charge for this].
- Student resource centres: provides such facilities as a math tutor, writing tutor, technology instructor, and a computer support specialist. Also in the centre, you will find computers, laptops, digital cameras, computer projectors and other multimedia resources for use in course projects.

- Acting as a student representative on various committees, e.g. Staff Student Liaison Committees, OES Education and Quality Committee and Faculty Programmes Committee, OR providing comments to your student representative to feedback on your behalf.
- Serving as a student representative on Faculty Scrutiny Groups for programme validation.
- Taking part in programme validation meetings by joining a panel of students to meet with the Faculty Scrutiny Group.
- Joining a panel of students to meet with the External Examiners.

The ways in which the quality of your programme is checked, both inside and outside the University, are:

- Regular module and programme reports which are monitored by the Faculty.
- Programme validation, normally every five years.
- External examiners, who produce an annual report.
- Accreditation carried out by the Institute for Marine Engineering, Science and Technology (IMarEST).
- A national Research Assessment Exercise (our research activity contributes directly to the quality of your learning experience).
- Institutional Review by the Quality Assurance Agency.

Appendix 1:

Students are responsible for meeting the cost of essential textbooks, and of producing such essays, assignments, laboratory reports and dissertations as are required to fulfil the academic requirements for each programme of study. In addition to this, students registered for this programme also have to pay for:

Additional Costs

Type	Details
Clothing	Field course clothing: You will need to wear suitable clothing when attending field courses, e.g. waterproofs, walking boots. You can purchase these from any source.
IT	Data Storage: Students are expected to provide their own data storage device. Software Licenses: Will be provided by the University where appropriate. Hardware: It is advisable that students provide their own laptop or personal computer, although shared facilities are available across the University campus.
Stationery	You will be expected to provide your own day-to-day stationery items, e.g. pens, pencils, notebooks, etc. Any specialist stationery items will be specified under the Additional Costs tab of the relevant module profile.
Textbooks	Where a module specifies core texts these should generally be available on the reserve list in the library. However students may prefer to buy their own copies. These can be purchased from any source. Some modules suggest reading texts as optional background reading. The library may hold copies of such texts, or alternatively you may wish to purchase your own copies. Although not essential reading, you may benefit from the additional reading materials for the module.
Approved Calculators	Candidates may use calculators in the examination room only as specified by the University and as permitted by the rubric of individual examination papers. These may be purchased from any source.
Equipment and Materials	Field Equipment and Materials: For compulsory residential field courses, accommodation and travel are provided (for Independent Geology Mapping a fixed amount is provided to cover these costs for the least expensive area). You are usually expected to cover the costs of food and drink, although some courses may include meals. For optional field courses, students are asked to make a contribution to the travel and/or accommodation costs. Details are provided in the table below. Please note that if a field course is compulsory for your degree programme and you later move from that degree programme to one where that field course is optional, you will be charged for the cost of that field course. In addition to the field courses mentioned in this booklet, there are also one-day field courses associated with specific modules; students are expected to cover food and drink costs for these days, but transport is arranged and paid for by the department. As the department arranges transport, should students wish to make their own way to or from field courses, then they must meet these costs themselves.

	<p>SOES3020: Tenerife Field Course As this is an overseas field course which requires the department to make early flight bookings to minimise costs, students who pre-register for this module will be liable for the full flight costs if they subsequently opt not to take the module.</p> <p>SOES3025: Independent Geology Mapping Precise costs depend on specific arrangements made by students and on individual destinations. The department undertakes to cover the costs for accommodation and travel up to the cost of the least expensive destination, and currently provides £500 per student.</p> <p>Where a student contribution is made, invoices will be issued approximately 2 weeks prior to the start of a field course and payment will be due within 7 days.</p> <p>Laboratory Equipment and Materials: Oceanography students will receive a lab coat and waterproof notebook during Induction.</p>
<p>Printing and Photocopying Costs</p>	<p>Coursework, such as essays, projects, and dissertations, may be submittable online. However, some items will require submission as a printed copy, including some items where it is not possible to submit online. They also provide a large format printing service, e.g. Academic posters.</p>
