Programme Overview

Brief outline of the programme

Our Postgraduate Diploma in Nursing programme will support you in developing the knowledge, skills and attributes that you will need to play a role in leading the provision of evidence-led and compassionate nursing care to adults. You will gain specialist knowledge and skills in relation to the nursing needs of adults, and on graduation you will have eligibility to register with the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) as a Registered Nurse (Adult).

The programme reflects the strengths of Southampton University as a global, modern and research intensive institution. As a Southampton nursing graduate you will understand health needs within a global context and be responsive and inclusive towards marginalised groups, as well as understanding the challenges and opportunities offered by a globalised nursing workforce. You will gain the skills and expertise to embrace technology and innovate in order to support the health of people through digital technologies. Our position as a leading research intensive University provides an environment which will support you in developing the research awareness and

well-developed skills in critical analysis that underpin evidence based practice. By choosing to study nursing at the University of Southampton you will be studying within an inter-disciplinary community of practitioners who will foster pride in the role of the nurse.

Southampton nurse graduates are trained and encouraged to adopt a biopsychosocial approach to promoting and maintaining health and well-being, and to respond with compassion to the unique needs of all people. You will develop deep knowledge of how to meet person centred care needs, and high-level skills in decision making and managing complexity across a broad range of healthcare environments. The programme will also support you in developing the knowledge, skills and personal attributes that are necessary to lead and empower teams, and prepare you for roles in which you will lead the development of nursing care, healthcare services and the nursing profession.

The Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) 2018 specify that a pre-registration programme comprise of a minimum of 4600 hours. The programme is studied full-time over two years after successful completion of a Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) claim in which you must demonstrate 990 hours of relevant prior theoretical learning and 110 hours of prior practice learning.

You will undertake a range of modules comprising both theoretical and practice components in order to achieve the outcomes of the programme.

On successful completion of the programme you will have eligibility to register with the Nursing and Midwifery Council as a Registered Nurse. Applications to join the NMC register must be made within 5 years of completing your programme.

Your contact hours will vary depending on your module/option choices. Full information about contact hours is provided in individual module profiles.

Learning and teaching

Our Postgraduate diploma in Nursing programme is student-centred and is designed to encourage you as a graduate to build upon your existing skills of enquiry and active learning. In the University setting you will have innovative, research-led learning opportunities, delivered by inspiring educators to enable you to achieve modular and programme outcomes and understand the relevance of your learning experiences to your future role. In your practice placements your learning will be supported by experienced and knowledgeable assessors in practice. Whilst in practice you will be additional, but complementary to workforce requirements and so have the opportunity to meet your learning needs and develop competence.

Inter-professional and profession specific learning opportunities are scheduled throughout the programme and include large and small group teaching, seminars, simulated practice and independent learning. Field specific learning appropriate for your programme is taught by experienced educationalists and experts within your field from your first year. Technology enhanced learning is embedded within the curriculum and used to support face-to-face and independent learning. The programme will support you to become an independent, life-long learner as a graduate Registered Nurse.

You will receive the support of a Personal Academic Tutor who offers one-to-one support and advice throughout your time at the University, and will support you in your studies. You will also be a member of a smaller learning group of students who you will meet with at identified points in the programme.

A range of teaching and learning methods will be provided to enable you to meet the programme learning outcomes and the learning outcomes for each module. Further details are shown in the module outlines.

A variety of practice placements should give you the opportunity to develop your ability to apply knowledge and understanding in the delivery of proficient, safe and effective care to a diverse range of service users within your field of practice. You will be expected to follow the shift pattern allocated to you by each of your practice placements to ensure that you have appropriate support in practice and the opportunity to experience 24 hour care. You will be provided with opportunities to become competent and capable in the delivery of practice skills required in all fields of nursing and the particular skills required in your chosen field of nursing.

Assessment

The learning outcomes of the modules are assessed using a variety of fair and reliable assessment strategies designed to allow you to demonstrate your knowledge, understanding, competency and professional values.

Forms of assessment include essays, examinations and presentations, and assessment of your capability in practice by practice assessors. Assessment of practice and theory are balanced and there is no compensation between theory and practice learning as each component must be passed.

Timely and constructive feedback throughout your programme should enable you to develop your confidence and ability to reflect, and support you to identify learning needs, areas for improvement and available educational support.

Each module is assessed to enable you to demonstrate that you have met the module and programme learning outcomes. Assessment methods are varied and include written work, examinations, presentations and assessment in practice.

Special Features of the programme

During your programme your will undertake 2,200 hours of practice learning in order to ensure that you gain the experience and skills you will need in order to work as a registered nurse. Some of this experience will be in simulated environment, but the majority will be undertaken in placements over the course of your programme. Your placements will be organised by the University and will be undertaken within a variety of hospital and community settings in local NHS Trusts and other healthcare providers.

In your first year you will gain foundational skills in providing person centred care to meet the fundamental physical and mental health needs of people of all ages. In the second year you will develop specialist skills in managing and co-ordinating the care of adult patients and prepare for your leadership role as a registered nurse within the workforce

The programme is full-time and students must be available for study / practice placement during the weeks indicated on the published programme calendar.

Please note: As a research-led University, we undertake a continuous review of our programmes to ensure quality enhancement and to manage our resources. As a result, this programme may be revised during a student's period of registration; however, any revision will be balanced against the requirement that the student should receive the educational service expected. Educational Aims of the Programme

The aim of the programme is to enable you to develop into a competent practitioner who meets the requirement for entry into the NMC Register in your chosen field of practice and a higher education degree awarded by the University of Southampton. The programme aims to provide you with the knowledge and skills to provide excellent, evidence-led, compassionate nursing care and the specialised knowledge you need to develop future nursing practice and health care through confident proactive leadership, practice development aided by technology and a global perspective and research.

Programme Learning Outcomes

Knowledge and Understanding

On successful completion of this programme you will have detailed knowledge and deep understanding of:

- A1. Human development from conception to death
- A2. The relationship between social and psychological factors on health, illness and nursing practice
- A3. Applied human anatomy and physiology and pathophysiology associated with key body systems
- A4. The evidence base and rationale for the treatment approaches and nursing care that may be needed in commonly encountered mental, physical, behavioural and cognitive health conditions
- A5. Pharmacodynamics, pharmacokinetics and the role of the nurse in the safe and effective medicines management
- A6. Global and public health priorities, and the role of the nurse in reducing health inequalities, promoting health and preventing disease
- A7. Application of the ethical and legal principles which underpin collaborative and person-centred health care practice
- A8. The nature, role and influence of health and social care policy in achieving excellence in care and driving change
- A9. The means by which people may be influenced through positive relationships, team and individual behaviours and organisational cultures
- A10. The means by which risk can be understood, identified and managed at individual, team and organisational levels in order to improve the quality and safety of care

Teaching and Learning Methods

To assist you in developing your knowledge and understanding of nursing a wide range of teaching and learning methods are employed. These include lectures, seminars (which may be tutor or student led), on-line work packages and applied knowledge to skills and simulation sessions and learning in a practice environment. You will be encouraged from an early stage to supplement and consolidate your knowledge and understanding by independent reading and will receive guidance and resources for this independent study.

Assessment Methods

Assessment of your knowledge and understanding is undertaken throughout the programme and through a variety of assessment methods. These include written assignments, examinations, individual and group presentations and assessment in practice. Formative assessments will help you to prepare for summative (formal) assessment. You will also receive feedback on formally assessed work.

Subject Specific Intellectual and Research Skills

On successful completion of this programme you will be able to:

- B1. Adopt a critical perspective and a systematic approach to reviewing, developing, and maintaining the safety and quality of health care services
- B2. Critically evaluate and synthesise evidence from multiple sources, including professional colleagues and those receiving care, to reach sound judgements and solve problems to maintain and improve safety and quality of care.
- B3. Utilise knowledge of research methods, ethics and governance to critically appraise and synthesise research findings in order to promote best nursing practice
- B4. Demonstrate political engagement and the understanding of organisational structures and health economics necessary for the nurse to contribute to organisational change

Teaching and Learning Methods

Subject specific intellectual and research skills are embedded within the curriculum and enable you to embrace an inquiring and critical approach to nursing knowledge and practice. Specific modules with a research and evidence based focus will develop these skills to a deeper level. Emphasis is placed on student engagement with discussion and debate about evidence based practice along with independent reading, literature searching and evidence appraisal.

Assessment Methods

Assessment of your subject specific intellectual skills is undertaken throughout the programme and in similar ways to the assessment of your knowledge and understanding. The use of evidence to support your nursing practice is important from the outset of the programme, and successful completion of your research project will demonstrate achievement of these skills. You will receive feedback on formally assessed work.

Transferable and Generic Skills

On successful completion of this programme you will be able to:

- C1. Demonstrate a well developed ability for independent study, making appropriate use of reflection and feedback to evaluate your own capabilities, appraise alternatives and plan and implement actions
- C2. Communicate clearly, appropriately and effectively to a range of audiences using appropriate verbal, non-verbal, written, numerical and visual literacy skills
- C3. Demonstrate digital literacy and competence, and insight into how a range of technology may be used to effectively support learning and practice
- C4. Work effectively independently and in teams
- C5. Demonstrate digital literacy and competence, and insight into how in using a range of technology may be used to effectively support learning and practice

Teaching and Learning Methods

Generic skills are embedded throughout the programme and developing your communication skills, fundamental to nursing, begins with the first module of study. There will be times when you work in multi-professional teams both in University and in practice, and developing the skills of reflective practice will underpin your own self-awareness and contribution to team working. On-line learning and the Developing Professional Practice module at the end of the second year allows you the opportunity to plan and appraise your own learning and development.

Assessment Methods

Assessment of transferable and generic skills is achieved through a range of module assessments including; computer assisted examinations, written assignments, group and individual presentations and assessment of practice.

On successful completion of this programme you will be able to:

- E1. Act as an accountable professional and role model as a registered nurse and uphold the NMC Code.
- E2. Support people, families, communities and populations in promoting health and preventing ill health

- E4. Provide and delegate care that is person-centred and compassionate, and work in partnership to evaluate the effectiveness of this care.

- E6. Contribute to the continuous monitoring and quality improvement in order to enhance safety, health outcomes and people's experience of care.
- E7. Coordinate and manage the complex nursing and integrated care needs of people at any stage of their lives, across a range of organisations and settings
- E8. Demonstrate excellent communication and relationship management skills, together with proficiency in nursing procedures to a level appropriate for your intended field of practice

Teaching and Learning Methods

A range of teaching and learning methods will be provided to enable you to meet the discipline specific programme outcomes as you progress through each part of the programme.

A range of practice placements will give you the opportunity to develop your ability to apply knowledge and understanding in the delivery of proficient, safe and effective care to a diverse range of service users within your field of practice. During practice placements you will be expected to follow the shift pattern allocated to you to ensure that you have appropriate support in practice and the opportunity to experience 24 hour care. You will be provided with opportunities to become competent and capable in the delivery of some practice skills required in all fields of nursing but in particular the skills required in your chosen field of nursing.

Assessment Methods

Each theory and practice module is assessed to enable you to demonstrate that you have met the module and programme learning outcomes. The details of individual modules can be found on the module profile. The practice assessment document (PAD) guides you in the assessment of practice and demonstrates your achievement of discipline specific outcomes.

The final award, Postgraduate Diploma in Adult Nursing gives eligibility to register with the Nursing and Midwifery Council as a Registered Nurse on successful completion of all parts. The exit awards of PG Cert HE and PG Diploma (Health Studies) do NOT provide eligibility to apply to the NMC for registration purposes.

Pre-registrations nursing programmes are subject to a variation in the regulations for Progression, Determination and

Classification of Results: Standalone Masters Programmes and there is no opportunity to internally repeat any part of the programme. External repeats may not be taken on practice placements.

You will normally be required to complete your programme within 5 years of commencing study (inclusive of any periods of suspension).

Support for student learning

There are facilities and services to support your learning some of which are accessible to students across the University and some of which will be geared more particularly to students in your particular Faculty or discipline area.

The University provides:

- library resources, including e-books, on-line journals and databases, which are comprehensive and up-todate; together with assistance from Library staff to enable you to make the best use of these resources
- high speed access to online electronic learning resources on the Internet from dedicated PC Workstations
 onsite and from your own devices; laptops, smartphones and tablet PCs via the Eduroam wireless
 network. There is a wide range of application software available from the Student Public Workstations.
- computer accounts which will connect you to a number of learning technologies for example, the Blackboard virtual learning environment (which facilitates online learning and access to specific learning resources)
- standard ICT tools such as Email, secure filestore and calendars.
- access to key information through the MySouthampton Student Mobile Portal which delivers timetables, Module information, Locations, Tutor details, Library account, bus timetables etc. while you are on the move.
- IT support through a comprehensive website, telephone and online ticketed support and a dedicated helpdesk in the Hartley Library.
- Enabling Services offering support services and resources via a triage model to access crisis management, mental health support and counselling. Support includes daily Drop In at Highfield campus at 13.00 15.00 (Monday, Wednesday and Friday out of term-time) or via on-line chat on weekdays from 14.00 16.00. Arrangements can also be made for meetings via Skype.
- assessment and support (including specialist IT support) facilities if you have a disability, long term health problem or Specific Learning Difficulty (e.g. dyslexia).
- the Student Services Centre (SSC) to assist you with a range of general enquiries including financial matters, accommodation, exams, graduation, student visas, ID cards
- Career and Employability services, advising on job search, applications, interviews, paid work, volunteering and internship opportunities and getting the most out of your extra-curricular activities alongside your degree programme when writing your CV
- Other support that includes health services (GPs), chaplaincy (for all faiths) and 'out of hours' support for students in Halls and in the local community, (18.00-08.00)
- A Centre for Language Study, providing assistance in the development of English language and study skills for non-native speakers.

The Students' Union provides

- an academic student representation system, consisting of Course Representatives, Academic Presidents, Faculty Officers and the Vice-President Education; SUSU provides training and support for all these representatives, whose role is to represent students' views to the University.
- opportunities for extracurricular activities and volunteering
- an Advice Centre offering free and confidential advice including support if you need to make an academic appeal
- Support for student peer-to-peer groups, such as Nightline.

The programme includes a variety of practice placements. The University will organise your practice placements and support your learning in practice in association with your practice assessor.

Methods for evaluating the quality of teaching and learning

Career Opportunities

Nursing Students from the University of Southampton are highly respected and gain employment both locally and across the UK in a variety of healthcare settings and in the public and private sector. Your nursing degree is a passport to a wide range of short and longer term career opportunities in both the UK and overseas, often with opportunity to specialise in a particular area of nursing or apply your nursing knowledge and degree more widely.

The range of your practice placements during your programme will enable you to experience a breadth of nursing practice, and you will be actively supported to identify where you may wish to work for your first post as a Registered Nurse.

We have a dedicated School Lead for Employability who is supported by the University's Careers and Employability Service. In addition to timetabled careers activities in your curriculum, you will be invited from your first year onwards to attend the School's annual Health Sciences Careers Fair. Here you will meet a diverse range of potential employers and gain invaluable early careers advice about your options. The current nursing recruitment market indicates significant choice for students looking for their first post and 99% of our students gain employment on graduation.
