Background to the research

This research has been carried out over four years (2010/11, 2011/12, 2012/13 and 2013/14) against a backdrop of...

- Over 1m unemployed young people (November 2011, 16-24 year olds)
- Graduate full-time (FT) employment fell continuously between 2002 and 2010, from 57% of graduates in 2002 to 51% of graduates in 2010
- Education for Sustainable Development is of increasing policy relevance through climate change and the 'green economy'
- An increasing focus on the idea of 'graduate attributes' upon leaving higher education
- Changing funding landscape within higher education including increase in maximum fees to £9000 in 2012






ESD is in demand and continues to be seen as a core agenda for universities

Willingness to sacrifice £1000 from salary for an employer with a strong SD record increases throughout university career




Q.40: We are interested in your prioritisation of social and environmental aspects into the future. For the following pairings, please select which option you think that you would choose in the future.
