

Community Outreach

Particular focus on the following groups who are under represented in higher education:

- Care leavers
- Black and minority ethnic students
- Mature students
- Disabled students



Community Outreach

- Work with staff and students across the University, and in collaboration with external organisations to:
- promote Higher Education through a range of activities and events for target groups.
- maximise the quality of opportunities and experiences.
- develop print and online materials/resources for specific target groups.
- Work with colleagues in professional services and faculties to enhance existing support programmes/activities



Care Leavers

- Pre-application visits and e-mentoring support available
- Potential entrance through the University's Access to Southampton scheme
- A £1,000 care leavers bursary for each year of course
- An additional £1000 Access to Learning Fund bursary also available.
- £3,000 fee waiver if income is under £25,000
- University accommodation available 365 days a year.
- Designated Support from a member of Financial Information and Assistance and Wellbeing teams.



Mature Students

- Tailored talks for mature/access students at local colleges
- Attending information events for mature students
- Working with Health Sciences to set up visit day for local access students.



BME Students

- Working in partnership with:
 - third sector organisations working with BME students,
 i.e. Generating Genius and Social Mobility Foundation
 - Sixth forms/colleges with high proportion of BME students



Disabled Students

- Working in partnership with Enabling Services.
- Currently focusing on developing links with learning support staff in sixth forms and colleges

Encouraging Diversity - Access to Southampton

Access to Southampton (A2S) is an alternative admissions scheme designed to provide financial assistance and special consideration to students who meet 2 of the following criteria:

- In receipt of a 16-19 Bursary or similar grant
- In the first generation of immediate family to apply to Higher Education (excluding brothers/sisters)
- Attend a secondary school which achieved less than 53% 5 A to C passes (including English and Maths) at GCSE in 2010
- Only option is to attend a local University
- Studies disrupted by circumstances in personal or domestic life
- Living or grew up in public care



Why are we running A2S?

- We realise that not all students can show their talent and potential through grades alone. A2S is a way for us to see a students achievements in context.
- Access Agreement the University is committed to widening participation, to ensure that we recruit students from a wide range of backgrounds.

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What do students get by applying through A2S?

Successful A2S applicants receive an **alternative offer** which is normally two grades below the standard offer, as well as a **£1000 A2S Bursary** in their first year of study.

During the application process students also get the chance to visit the University of Southampton and work with academic tutors as part of our **Summer School** programme.

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Access to Southampton - Programme

- 3 main interactions:
 - Summer School, during the summer of their year 12 studies.
 - A chance to visit the University and have academic contact time.
 - Academic Assignment, which they complete over the summer.
 - This allows admissions tutors to see what the students can do and gives them a chance to see what an undergraduate piece of work is like.
 - Easter Transition event, for those who successfully receive an A2S offer from us.
 - Skills session to prepare them for University in the Autumn
