

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# Director's report

I was honoured and delighted to take over the Directorship of the IML (Institute of Maritime Law) on the 1st of February 2022, and would like to express my sincere gratitude to my predecessor, Dr Alexandros Ntovas, for all his splendid work as IML Director through the difficult global circumstances of the last three years. With its 41 years of history, the IML is the oldest centre for maritime law studies in the world, and the oldest Institute of the University. In the last four decades, the IML has trained thousands of maritime lawyers from all over the world and has established itself as the world leading centre for maritime law.

It has been a very successful year for the IML, and the following are just some of the highlights of the successful activities conducted by the Institute.

In May, the IML hosted a workshop on Electronic Bills of Lading. The Workshop explored current electronic bills of lading practice and legal ramifications and considered the UK Electronic Trade Documents Bill following its recent adoption by the House of Lords. The speakers were distinguished industry representatives, legal practitioners, and academics, including Boaz Lessem (WaveBL), Marina Comninos (ICE Digital Trade), Richard Lord KC (Brick Court Chambers and IML Fellow), Omer Guy (Digital Container Shipping Association (DCSA)), Luca Castellani (UNCITRAL: United Nations Commission on International Trade Law), Michael Biltoo (Kennedys) and Liang Zhao (IML) The event was thought provoking and insightful and is one of a series of initiatives hosted by IML to lead the evolving academic and industry discourse on topics of significance in the international maritime sector.

In August/September 2023, the IML hosted its 47th Short Course in Maritime Law for practitioners. The Institute of Maritime Law Short Course for Practitioners has been providing innovative maritime law training to delegates from around the world for the last 48 years. First of its kind worldwide, it is the only comprehensive residential Course available on maritime law in the UK and at international level. The Short Course combines a top-quality learning environment with world leading expertise. The fusion of academic excellence and practical insight provided by our leading scholars,

industry professionals and legal practitioners ensures an in-depth dissection of the legal issues affecting today's shipping industry, as well as a crucial pragmatic advantage for the delegates. The Short Course is unique in its essence, its history and its reputation and is a key undertaking for the Institute of Maritime Law. We are proud and honoured to have almost half a century of tradition in providing continuing professional education in maritime law.

In October 2023, a delegation from the Institute of Maritime Law comprising Professor Andrea Lista (IML Director), Dr Ainhoa Campàs Velasco, Professor Andrew Serdy (IML Members) and Mr Richard Coles (IML Fellow) delivered talks at the Annual OST Symposium in Maritime Law. The OST Symposium is an annual event which sees the IML, the Tulane Centre for Maritime Law and the Scandinavian Institute of Maritime Law come together to discuss current themes in maritime law. This year's theme was Sustainability in the Shipping Sector. **Professor Andrea Lista** delivered a talk on the contractual initiatives on sustainability in the maritime industry; **Dr Ainhoa Campas Velasco** spoke on sustainability of migration at sea; Professor Andrew **Serdy** focused his intervention on sustainability and fisheries policy, whereas Mr Richard Coles spoke about sustainability related initiatives in leisure shipping and the yachting industry.

On 8th November 2023, we hosted our 41st Donald O'May lecture at The Law Society. Alongside the Short Course, our annual Lecture represents the history, the legacy, and the tradition of the IML. The speaker of this year, **Sir Nigel Teare** (former Admiralty Judge), gave a thought-provoking and insightful lecture taking us through the intricacies of apportionment of liability in collision cases. It was a delight to see so many esteemed colleagues and familiar faces.

On 30 November and 1st December, the IML and Southampton Marine and Maritime Institute's Conference on Sustainability in the Shipping and Maritime Sector took place at the National Oceanography Centre in Southampton. A long list of academic, industry and regulator Speakers, Chairs and Rapporteurs (listed below) who contributed with their expertise in different areas, from Oceanography/Environment to Technology Vectors, Industry, and the Legal/Regulatory framework. The Event was funded by Gard AS through the GARD/IML Research Fund.

We think that the format of the Conference and its multidisciplinary approach rendered it unique in its essence. In August 2023, the Southampton Institute of Maritime Law hosted its distinguished Maritime Law Short Course, which garnered participation from 37 delegates representing various companies from around the shipping industry and from multiple countries. Led by members of the Institute of Maritime Law, renowned industry experts, and leading scholars, the sessions provided an enriching and insightful educational experience.

This comprehensive two-week course, acclaimed as the UK's sole residential program on maritime law, expertly combined academic rigor with practical industry insights.

In addition to classroom learning, delegates had immersive experiences that broadened their grasp of the maritime industry. They visited the National Oceanography Centre Southampton (NOCS), gaining firsthand exposure to cutting-edge maritime research and technology. Additionally, a guided boat trip along Southampton Harbour provided practical glimpses into maritime operations while infusing the learning experience alongside social interactions with each other and the IML team.

Throughout the course, the curriculum delved deeply into pivotal aspects of maritime law, covering topics such as maritime contracts, international conventions, marine insurance, environmental regulations, and dispute resolution mechanisms. These sessions not only imparted theoretical knowledge but also equipped delegates with actionable strategies applicable to their professional roles.

In addition to classroom learning, delegates had immersive experiences that broadened their grasp of the maritime industry.

Led by the Institute of Maritime Law members and joined by industry experts, the sessions fostered engaging discussions, interactive learning experiences, and insightful case studies. # Sustainability Lecture

Ninety per cent of the goods traded worldwide are carried by sea, and there are approximately 50,000 merchant navy vessels operating in routes across the oceans. Although transporting goods by sea is less environmentally detrimental per quantum of goods than the equivalent journey by road, rail, or air, that vast scale of international trade means that global shipping has a major environmental footprint and produces a significant amount of greenhouse gases and other forms of pollution.

It is estimated that 940 million tonnes of CO2 are produced every year by the shipping industry. The industry is deemed to be responsible for approximately 2.5% of global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and is considered one of the most vexing sectors for carbon emissions reduction.

## Research

**Professor Andrea Lista** is currently finalising an Article on the Assignment of Arbitration agreement to third parties within the context of maritime disputes, and two monographs. One book is on the "Third Parties and the Arbitration of Maritime Disputes," and the second manuscript is titled "The Law of Containers".

**Dr Alexandros X.M Ntovas** acted as Co-Investigator the project of "Industrial Decarbonisation Research and Innovation Centre, Port to Pipeline CO2–P2PCO2", which was funded by the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council and led by Professor Damon Teagle, Southampton Marine and Maritime Institute. In addition to this work, Alexandros' research this year was focused on research outputs in legal regulation of autonomous ships.

**Dr Liang Zhao** organised and presented on "Workshop on Electronic Bills of Lading", funded by Law School's Strategic Research Fund and Institute of Maritime Law, Southampton, 18 May 2023

**Mr Richard Coles** has undertaken private research over the past year in two topical and increasingly problematic areas for both commercial shipping and the superyacht sector, namely, sanctions and sustainability.

# Professor Andrea Lista, Director of the Institute of Maritime Law

Andrea's research interests lie within the areas of International Trade (contracts concluded on shipment terms), the enforcement of maritime claims, international commercial arbitration and competition law. He has written several articles and books on these subjects, and these have been cited as authoritative in courts worldwide.

Andrea has lectured for many years in Southampton, London, and Exeter, and has taught professional courses for lawyers and judges at national and international levels. In the past, Andrea has also acted as Legal consultant for the European Commission and European Parliament and appeared as an expert witness before the Houses of Parliament. Before re-joining the University of Southampton, Andrea has been a Lecturer at Queen Mary College, University of London, Associate Professor at the University of Southampton (where he was a Member of the Institute of Maritime Law), and

Chair in Commercial Law at the University of Exeter (where he has led the Law School to the REF 2021 as Director of Research). Throughout his Academic career, Andrea has been very actively involved in PhD supervision; to date, he has supervised 16 PhD students to completion, and has examined a vast number of PhD Vivas both as External and Internal Examiner.

In May 2013, Andrea was awarded the 'ETA Excellence in Teaching Award as the Overall Outstanding Lecturer in the School of Law', University of Southampton, and the Vice Chancellor Teaching Award for Excellence in Teaching'. At the University of Exeter, Andrea has been commended by the DVC for Education for excellence in teaching in 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020.

Professionally, before taking his place as Director of the IML, Andrea has acted as counsel for a law firm in London, gaining a reputation as an active legal consultant for law firms and companies in the fields of maritime commercial law and arbitration. In addition to leading the IML, Andrea delivers Key Speeches and Lectures, and continues his research in the areas of Contracts concluded on Shipment terms, Arbitration of Maritime Disputes and Enforcement of Maritime Claims.



### **Dr Ainhoa Campas Velasco**

Ainhoa Campàs Velasco is Lecturer in Law at the School of Law, University of Southampton. In 2021, she completed her PhD entitled 'Adrift in international law: towards a place of safety for sea migrants' for which she had obtained the M/Phil/PhD Vice-Chancellor's Award scholarship. Ainhoa first joined the University of Southampton in 2007, collaborating with the Institute of Maritime Law in a number of projects. She was a part-time lecturer at Southampton Law School from 2008 to 2014. In 2020 she collaborated as postdoctoral Research Fellow at the Law School in the Project 'Saharan and Mediterranean Cross-Border Migration and Deaths: the Impacts on Economic and Social Development of African Countries' (Principal investigator: Dr Remigius N Nwabueze). Ainhoa is a Qualified Lawyer, admitted to the Bar Association of Madrid in 1998. She has a background of ten years of legal practice in two leading maritime law firms in Madrid, specialising in litigation, cargo

claims, charterparty disputes and maritime administrative proceedings. Ainhoa is a Member of the International Law Association recently established Committee on Protection of People at Sea. Ainhoa gave oral evidence given at the House of Commons, Home Affairs Select Committee on the inquiry into channel crossings, migration and asylum-seeking routes through the EU, 18 November 2020. The report was released in July 2022 mentions Ainhoa's intervention on paragraph 53 (House of Commons, Home Affairs Committee: Channel Crossings, Migration and Asylum.



### **Dr Alexandros Ntovas**

Dr Alexandros X.M. Ntovas is an expert advocate and tenured academic in the areas of international law of the sea, admiralty, navigational freedoms and practice, marine environmental law and shipping regulation. He is Associate Professor (at the level of Readership) in Maritime Law, and the former Director of the Institute of Maritime Law, UK (1 February 2020-2023). He has practiced public and administrative law, and acts on numerous occasions as a policy advisor to governments, including the European Union, the public sector and the shipping industry. His expertise lies in the law of the sea and ocean governance; admiralty, with a focus on wet shipping law; navigational freedoms and practice, as well as in issues regarding piracy and other aspects of contemporary safety and security of ships, ports and offshore installations. He enjoys a strong academic background in public international law, particularly in the law of treaties and international dispute

settlement, while his further interests also cover the niche areas of legal historiography and reasoning within an interdisciplinary perspective. He publishes internationally on the above matters, as well as speaking in high-profile international fora and conferences. He is a Fellow of the British Higher Education Academy and derives extensive teaching experience from universities in the United Kingdom and abroad through visiting professorships and/or by formal invitations, in addition to discharging frequently the duties of external examiner. Moreover, he conducts frequently training seminars and participates in devising and offering executive professional courses for practitioners, government cadres, diplomatic corps and members of the judiciary, naval academies, policy institutional establishments and international organisations.



### **Professor Andrew Serdy**

Andrew Serdy, Professor of the Public International Law of the Sea and a former Director of the IML Institute, is on the Board of Editors of Ocean Development & International Law. Briefly a solicitor with Freehill, Hollingdale & Page in Sydney, Andrew then served the Australian Government Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in several diplomatic positions before specialising in the law of the sea, including appearing in the preliminary objections phase of the Southern Bluefin Tuna arbitration, drafting much of the legal documentation for Australia's 2004 submission to the Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf (CLCS), and involvement with the negotiation of the 2003 Sunrise-Troubadour unitisation agreement with East Timor and the 2004 maritime boundary treaty with New Zealand. Strategies for Effective Control" financed by Lloyds Register Foundation. Since 2019 Ulrich is teaching preparatory courses for MCA Oral Exams for Chief Mates and Masters at Warsash Maritime School and in 2023 became a Fellow at the University of Southampton Institute of Maritime Law.



### **Dr Feng Wang**

Dr Feng Wang is a Lecturer in Law and a member of the Institute of Maritime Law at University of Southampton Law School. His research interests are primarily in the fields of insurance law, maritime law.

# Terms of Reference

#### Aim

- The Institute of Maritime Law (IML) should aim to be (i) a major centre for research, study and dissemination of maritime law, enjoying an international reputation for excellence and (ii) a focus for professional interest in maritime law.
- The IML shall endeavour to fulfil its aim through a number of means including, but not limited to,
   (i) the provision of maritime law courses and seminars (ii) the organisation of public lectures in maritime law and (iii) the maintenance of a library facility for the study of maritime law.

#### Governance

 The IML is a research and enterprise centre within the Law School. The IML shall at all times comply with all rules and regulations in force from time to time within the Law School, Faculty and University structure.

#### Organisation

- All academic staff in the Law School with an interest in maritime law may be Academic Members of the IML, as may others from outside the Law School, from time to time.
- 5. The IML shall have a Director appointed by the Head of School in consultation with the Dean and Academic Members. The Director shall be responsible for taking decisions regarding all matters relating to the management of the Institute from time to time and shall fulfil the Institute's internal reporting obligations and shall, on behalf of the Institute, liaise with other entities within and outside the University. The Director shall invite Law School Academics and others with an interest in Maritime Law to become Members of the Institute of Maritime Law, subject to the approval of the Head of School. The tenure of the Director shall be a period of three years.

- 6. The IML shall have an Operations Committee composed from time to time of Academic Members of the Institute as requested by the Director. The role of the Operations Committee is to assist the Director with the day-to-day running of IML activities. The Operations Committee shall meet from time to time as necessary. All IML Academic Members may attend and participate in meetings of the Operations Committee, subject to permission of the IML Director.
- 7. The IML shall have an Advisory Board composed of approximately six persons external to the University. It may also include a lesser number of persons internal to the University but external to the Law School. The Advisory Board shall advise the Director on a range of strategic matters, including developments within the shipping industry, continuing professional education, collaboration with external partners, research funding opportunities and other matters that may arise from time to time. Advisory Board Members shall generally be maritime professionals from the legal community and beyond. Advisory Board Members shall be invited to join the Advisory Board for a period of three years by the Director in consultation with the Operations Committee and the Head of School. The Advisory Board shall meet at least two times per year with the Director and Academic Members.


#### Review

- 8. These Terms of Reference shall be reviewed annually before the commencement of the academic year by the Head of School, the Academic Members and Director, and any amendment shall be approved by a majority of the Academic Members.
- These Terms of Reference enter into effect on 29th September 2020 and supersede the 1998 Constitution of the IML in its entirety.
