The balance of the information sought is commercially exempt. As Section 43(2) is a qualified exemption, the University has considered the public interest test:

Factors favouring disclosure

- Openness and Transparency: it is in the public interest that the University, as a public authority, is as open and transparent as possible in the way that we operate and the way in which decisions are made. 0,50

Factors favouring non-disclosure

- Commercial strategy: it is not in the public interest to disclose information that would undermine the University's capacity to effectively compete with other higher education providers. Higher education providers are in a highly competitive market and sharing the requested information would harm the University's ability to compete for students since if it was disclosed, the information requested could be freely exploited by the University's competitors to modify their own commercial strategy around admissions for similar programmes.

Revealing the information sought would be detrimental to the University's competitive prospects by giving competitors an insight into the performance of these programmes and enable them to adopt a commercial strategy which targets these student populations.

Given the above considerations, the University concludes that it is in the greater public interest not to disclose the information at this time. We hope you understand that there is a need to balance Freedom of Information with our ability to offer the best standards in teaching and research.

If you do not feel that we have dealt with your request in accordance with the requirements of Part 1 of the Act, you may request a review. Your request for a review **must** specify in what respect you n w. form consider that the requirements of <u>Part I</u> of the Act have not been met; mere dissatisfaction with our response is insufficient.
