#### Question

Under the Freedom Information Act, please could I request data relating to both 2020 and 2021 application cycles to Medicine (A100) please?

1) How many international applicants applied for the undergraduate medicine course?

2) How many international applicants were offered an interview?

3) How many international applicants were successful in receiving an offer?

4) What was the UCAT threshold for international applicants in 2020 and 2021 cycles?

5) Could a breakdown of Countries represented throughout international applications be shared via spreadsheet please?

Could the response be sent directly to this email address please?

#### Answer

If you do not feel that we have dealt with your request in accordance with the requirements of <u>Part I</u> of the Act, you may request a review. In accordance with section 5.3 of the <u>Code of Practice</u>, a request for a review must sent within 40 working days of the date of this letter. The University is not obliged to accept any requests for a review beyond 40 working days. We will acknowledge your request for a review and endeavour to respond within 20 working days of its receipt but please note that a deadline for a review response is not prescribed by the Act.

The Information Commissioner is responsible for enforcing rights of access to information and the operation of the publication scheme. You may apply to the Information Commissioner in writing (FOI/EIR Complaints Resolution, Information Commissioner's Office, Wycliffe House, Water Lane, Wilmslow, Cheshire SK9 5AF) or <u>electronically</u> for a decision whether, in any specified respect, your request for information has been dealt with by the University in accordance with the requirements of <u>Part I</u> of the Act. The Information Commissioner will not normally act unless they are satisfied that the University's review procedure has been exhausted.
