Explore our Policy Documents for advice on influencing UK government policy around music

These guides, compiled by the AHRC Hub's Policy Associate Rhys Lawrence in conversation with our Spoke projects and the wider Hub team, provide advice on how to influence UK government policy around music.

'Government and Music Policy Guidance' provides a general introduction to the structure of UK government, strategies for following and influencing policy developments, and an overview of key organisations and publications in music policy. It contains advice on how to interact with select committees and all-party parliamentary groups, how to produce and deliver a policy brief, and alternative methods for the communication of policy work.

The remaining three cover specific policy areas: music and social justice, musical education, and creative health. These more specific documents provide a brief introduction to their respective field, including key ideas and challenges, and lists of useful documents and organisations from which a research project can begin. Wherever a document such as a report, brief or evaluative framework is mentioned in these guides, a link is provided for ease of access. <u>ACCESS THE POLICY RESOURCES HERE</u>.

The first two episodes of new **Shared Notes** Podcast are now live!



Launch of Free Education Resource: Pythagoras' Workshops Toolkit



<u>Pythagoras' Toolkit</u> features a cheeky modern-day puppet Pythagoras (with her bag of tools) challenging eight virtuoso classical musicians and a conductor to help her carry out musical experiments. Created by director and theatre maker <u>Rachel Warr</u> (Dotted Line Theatre) in collaboration with Southampton composer and conductor <u>Benjamin Oliver</u>, it is a playful, wordless show for family audiences which has been performed in Montreal (Canada) and Southampton.

'Pythagoras' Workshops Toolkit' has been designed for educators and practitioners. The resource offers ways to explore music, specifically graphic scores and conducting, through

music, sound-making, drawing and puppetry. It has been developed by Rachel Warr, Benjamin Oliver and Chi Ying Lam.

The toolkit draws on ideas, and includes clips, from the theatre show *Pythagoras' Toolkit*, but it is not necessary to have seen the performance to engage with the activities. It is has been developed for participants aged 7-11 (Key Stage 2), although can be adapted for younger or older learners. It can be used at a range of scales, from one-off workshops to 6-week teaching blocks.

The Pythagoras' Workshops Toolkit consists of a PDF that outlines a wide range of activities, linking to related 31 project tutorial videos hosted on YouTube and sheet music resources. The toolkit is openly licensed under a Creative Commons license.

Event Recap - Beyond Borders: Knowledge Exchange Day

CMESJ has joined with colleagues across the University of Southampton to organise a one-day conference on **10 December**, marking **Human Rights Day**. The programme can be found here: Beyond Borders Programme.pdf

This **one-day conference** offered an opportunity to showcase research across the University related to migration and displacement, refugees, and asylum seekers, linked to the anniversary of the signing of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The event was designed to build on earlier mapping work that supports the University of Southampton's application for **University of Sanctuary** status.

The day included opportunities for networking and was designed to foster **interdisciplinary collaborative working**. There was also space provided for **early career researchers** to present their work. Through this event, we were able to acknowledge the dedication and commitment

of colleagues across the University and in the wider community, as well as the impact their meaningful contributions have made in this area.

The Southampton Centre for Music Education and Social Justice is pleased to announce a **Study Day on 'Sounds of Climate Justice'** on Friday 24 February 2026. We invite submissions for **provocations of around 10 minutes**, relating to any intersectional reflections on, or musical responses to, the challenges of the climate crisis, and the interventions that music studies can make in the pursuit of climate justice.

This will be an in-person study day, although virtual or pre-recorded presentations can be accommodated.

The day will feature a mix of academic presentations, musical performances, and workshops, with time for reflection. There will also be space for participants to co-construct and outline principles for a manifesto for music studies, committing—musically and/or musicologically—to sustainable futures of scholarship, practice, and curricular design.
