Minor	BA Archery <u>with</u> <u>a minor in</u> <u>Fettling</u>	Programme of study leading to addition of a Minor. Not available with Joint Awards	The substantive programme is described by a Programme Specification that permits students to take a Minor. Minor described by regulations and the Minor Catalogue.
Programme with option for YA or YIE	BA Archery, BA Archery with YA, BA Archery with YiE	A programme in which students may opt to spend one year abroad (YA) or in employment (YIE). Students may be able to apply to programmes with YA or YIE, as well as the 'parent' programme and will be able to change between awards up to a specified point. The 'parent' programme will have a UCAS code, and the YA and YIE variants may also have UCAS codes (largely a marketing-related decision). There are further variations. Engineering have a different YiE (called the Industrial Placement Year or IPY).	There will be a single Programme Specification that indicates whether students may take the programme with YA and YIE. The YA and YIE schemes are described by a separate definition document. Where specific schemes (e.g. Engineering's IPY) exist, they will be specified as variants within the main Programme Specification. Joint honours degree (unequal) Majority subject, Minority subject	BSc Archery with Fettling (NB. majority subject first) BArch Fettling, Fiddling and Fletching	Programme in which two or three subjects are studied in unequal proportions (of unweighted credits) as set out in the programme specification. Where two subjects are studied, there should be a minimum of 25% content and cannot be 50% or higher in the minority subject	Programme Specification (flagged as Joint)

Programme with integrated masters version	BA Archery/ MArch Archery	Programmes for which can lead to a L6 (honours degree) or to a related L7 (integrated Masters) award.	A separate Programme Specification should exist for L6 and L7 programmes.
		The decision on which award may be studied may be student led (choice) or University dictated (where progression onto the integrated masters variant relies on achievement at a certain level).	
		Typically, these will have common Parts I and II and may also share much of Part III but will differ in Parts III and IV.	
		Students may apply to either (they will have separate UCAS codes) but may also transfer between programmes at specified points.

Groups of related programmes	BA Archery BA Fletching BA Fiddling	A group of related programmes which share significant content, structure and Learning Outcomes.	Each award will have a separate Programme Specification. The term 'Pathway' should be preferred when describing programmes that form part of a group of related awards. Joint Awards (equal or unequal) may be members of groups of related programmes
		Each programme has an UCAS and UoS programme code, and students are able to transfer between awards within the group until a defined point.	
		Programmes within the group may share common parts (e.g. a common Part I or Part II).	
		In some instances, pathways may lead to different awards in the same subject, based on the modules taken (e.g. BA or BSc)
