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### Brief outline of the programme

The Pre-Masters programme is an integrated programme which is designed to equip talented international students to prepare for and take a University of Southampton taught Masters degree. The programme has two parts: in Part I you will acquire the academic and English language skills you will need to have success on a taught Masters programme and in Part II you will join one of specified range of Masters programmes at the University.

This programme specification is solely concerned with Part I of the programme.

Your contact hours will vary depending on your module/option choices. Full information about contact hours is provided in individual module profiles.

## Special Features of the programme

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The Pre-Masters programme has two entry points; September (two semesters) or January (one semester).

Entering the programme in:

- September for two semesters provides you with 24 months of integrated study
- January for one semester provides you with 18 months of integrated study.

Entry Points for MA Design and MSc Advanced Mechanical Engineering

If you are preparing for any of the MA Programmes at Winchester School of Art, you can only take the 24 month Pre-Masters programme.

If you are preparing for any of the MSc Engineering Masters Programmes, you can only take the 18 month Pre-Masters programme.

- your English language skills (as shown on a valid Secure English Language Test [SELT])
- the quality and relevance of your Bachelor's degree.

### Teaching and Learning Methods

In Part One of the Pre-Masters programme your academic and English language skills will be enhanced through the use of communicative teaching activities such as seminars, presentations, guided independent study and preparation for written assignments.

You will also take one or more subject specific modules allowing you to experience learning about a topic related to your Masters programme in an English speaking environment.

Feedback will be given to enable you to identify your strengths and weaknesses and to continue to develop your language and academic skills effectively. Tutors give extensive guidance, especially through recommendations of reference and source materials. You will learn to take more responsibility for your own learning as you progress through the programme.

### Assessment Methods

Your knowledge and understanding will be assessed in a variety of ways, which include examinations and coursework. Examinations assess your ability to apply your knowledge and understanding, often asking you to present an argument within a limited period of time. Coursework may include tasks such as long essays, class presentations, and seminars. These tasks test your ability to apply your knowledge and understanding of academic language and study skills, and to construct an in-depth argument.

### Subject Specific Intellectual and Research Skills

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On successful completion of this programme you will be able to:

- B1. Recognise and understand academic and professional vocabulary
- B2. Identify appropriate sources of information for your subject area
- B3. Locate resources for your subject area in the relevant libraries and online repositories

## **Teaching and Learning Methods**

The structure and content of Part One of the Pre-Masters programme gives you the opportunity to develop a range of cognitive skills which are developed in communicative learning activities such as in seminars, presentations, and discussions. Lectures develop the skills of processing and summarising information (internally and through note-taking and discussion). Critical thinking skills will be developed as you learn how to recognise subjectivity, analyse arguments objectively and apply these skills in your own work. You further develop cognitive skills through researching and writing essays. Regular feedback will be given to help you to identify any gaps in your cognitive skills. This allows you to develop your skills effectively by building on your strengths and addressing weaknesses or gaps in conveying subject specific knowledge or processing relevant research.

## **Assessment Methods**

Assessment methods include examinations and coursework. Examinations, whether written or oral, test your overall thinking skills in conditions where time and support for reflection are limited. Coursework assessment allows you to monitor your progress as well your testing your final results against the learning outcomes of the module concerned.

## Support for student learning

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There are facilities and services to support your learning some of which are accessible to students across the University and some of which will be geared more particularly to students in your particular faculty or discipline area.

The University provides:

- library resources, including e-books, on-line journals and databases, which are comprehensive and up-to-date; together with assistance from Library staff to enable you to make the best use of these resources
- high speed access to online electronic learning resources on the Internet from dedicated PC Workstations onsite and from your own devices, laptops, smartphones and tablet PCs, via the Eduroam wireless network. There is a wide range of application software available from the Student Public Workstations.
- computer accounts which will connect you to a number of learning technologies, for example, the Blackboard virtual learning environment (which facilitates online learning and access to specific learning resources)
- standard ICT tools such as Email, secure filestore and calendars.
- access to key information through the MySouthampton Student Mobile Portal which delivers timetables, Module information, locations, tutor details, library account, bus timetables etc. while you are on the move.
- IT support through a comprehensive website, telephone and online ticketed support and a dedicated helpdesk in the Hartley Library.
- Enabling Services offering support services and resources via a triage model to access crisis management, mental health support and counselling. Support includes daily Drop In at Highfield campus at 13.00 – 15.00 (Monday, Wednesday and Friday out of term-time) or via on-line chat on weekdays from 14.00 – 16.00. Arrangements can also be made for meetings via Skype.
- assessment and support (including specialist IT support) facilities if you have a disability, long term health problem or Specific Learning Difficulty (e.g. dyslexia)
- the Student Services Centre (SSC) to assist you with a range of general enquiries including financial matters, accommodation, exams, graduation, student visas, ID cards
- Career and Employability services, advising on job search, applications, interviews, paid work, volunteering and internship opportunities and getting the most out of your extra-curricular activities alongside your degree programme when writing your CV.
- other support that includes health services (GPs), chaplaincy (for all faiths) and 'out of hours' support for students in Halls and in the local community (18.00-08.00).
- An Academic Centre for International Students, providing assistance in the development of English language and study skills for non-native speakers.

The Students' Union provides

- an academic student representation system, consisting of Course Representatives, Academic Presidents, Faculty Officers and the Vice-President Education; SUSU provides training and support for all these representatives, whose role is to represent students' views to the University.
- opportunities for extracurricular activities and volunteering
- an Advice Centre offering free and confidential advice including support if you need to make an academic appeal
- Support for student peer-to-peer groups, such as Nightline.

## Methods for evaluating the quality of teaching and learning

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You will have the opportunity to have your say on the quality of the programme in the following ways:

- Completing student evaluation questionnaires for each module of the programme
- Acting as a student representative on various committees, e.g. Staff Student Liaison Committees, Faculty Programmes Committee OR providing comments to your student representative to feedback on your behalf.
- Serving as a student representative on Faculty Scrutiny Groups for programme validation
- Taking part in programme validation meetings by joining a panel of students to meet with the Faculty Scrutiny Group

The ways in which the quality of your programme is checked, both inside and outside the University, are:

- Regular module and programme reports which are monitored by the Faculty.

- Programme validation, normally every five years.
- External examiners, who produce an annual report.
- A national Research Assessment Exercise (our research activity contributes directly to the quality of your learning experience).
- Institutional Review by the Quality Assurance Agency.
